<u>To put</u>

Put:

- 1. To place. i.e. **Put** your book on the table.
- 2. To say; to state. i.e. Can I **put** a suggestion to you?
- 3. To write; to mark. i.e. **Put** the title on each page.

Put about: Change direction.

i.e. The wind put about.

Put across: Make someone understand.

i.e. I cannot **put across** the message.

Put aside:

- 1. Stop using. i.e. He **put aside** his old T.V.
- 2. Save. i.e. He had **put aside** enough money to buy a new laptop.

Put away: Put into the proper place.

i.e. When you finish the experiment **put away** the power supply and the cables.

Put back:

1. Replace.	i.e. Put back the diode that was in the circuit.
2. Move back.	i.e. Put the clock back by five minutes.
Put by: Save.	i.e. He puts by some money every month.

Put down:

1.	Place down.	i.e. Put your book	down on the floor.

2. Stop by strong action. i.e. **Put down** a rebellion.

Put forward:

1. Ask for something to be considered. i.e. Pu	t forward a new idea.

2. Move forward. i.e. **Put forward** the clock by five minutes.

Put in:

1. Ask for something to be considered. i.e. **Put in** a claim.

2. Do. i.e. I **put in** more than one hours for each English lesson.

3. Enter. i.e. The next train will **put in** at 7 p.m.

Put off:

- 1. Delay until later. i.e. We must **put off** all exams.
- 2. Make someone do something badly. i.e. Stop talking! You are **putting** me off.
- 3. Discourage someone; make him dislike something. i.e. He was **put off** research.

Put on:

- 1. Clothe with. i.e. **Put on** your coat.
- 2. Increase. i.e. **Put on** weight.
- 3. Cause to work or happen. i.e. **Put on** the radio.

Put on to: connect with (by telephone).

i.e. **Put** me on to Algiers, will you?

Put out:

- 1. Cause to be outside. i.e. He was **put out** the library at 5 p.m.
- Stop something from burning or being lit.
 i.e. The security man put out the fire in the laboratory.
- 3. Hold out. i.e. **Put out** your tongue.

4. Angry, worry. i.e. I am **put out** by people's behavior.

5. Trouble oneself. i.e. Please, don't **put** yourself **out** for us.

Put over: Make someone understand.

i.e. He is trying to **put over** his ideas.

Put through:

- 1. Connect by telephone. i.e. Please, Can you **put** me **through** to 02796.....
- 2. Do; make. i.e. He is trying to **put through** a deal.

Put together: Make something from different parts.

i.e. We must **put** the radio **together** again.

Put up:

- 1. Raise. i.e. **Put up** the volume of the radio.
- 2. Put in a place where it can be seen. i.e. **Put up** a notice.
- 3. Give a place to sleep to somebody. i.e. Can you **put** me **up** for the night.

A put up job: something arranged in advance in order to trick someone.

i.e. I don't believe it! It's a put up story.

Put up with: Bear without complaining.

i.e. We have to **put up with** high prices.

Put into practice: Use.

i.e. Put your English into practice.

Put pressure on someone: Try to get someone to do something by persuasion.

i.e. They had to **put pressure on** him before he accepted the job.

<u>To make</u>

Make:

- 1. Cause to exist. i.e. God **made** the world.
- 2. Cause to be. i.e. you **made** me angry.
- 3. Force someone/something to do something. i.e. He made the students work hard.
- 4. Ear, get. i.e. He **makes** 50000 DA a month.
- 5. Be the same as, equal. i.e. 100 cm **make** 1 metre.
- 6. Become. i.e. This student will **make** a good teacher.

Make for:

- 1. Go towards. i.e. We **made for** Algiers at 7 a.m.
- 2. Tend to produce. i.e. Chatting with students **makes for** good relations.

Make of: Think of.

i.e. What do you make of the boss?

Make off: Go away; escape.

i.e. The thief made off with the money.

Make out:

1.	Write out.	i.e. He made out a cheque for his wife.	

2. Be able to see, understand. i.e. Can you **make out** what is written here?

Make up:

- 1. Invent; think up; create. i.e. Try to **make up** a science fiction story.
- 2. Put things together in some way. i.e. He **made up** an electronic clock.
- 3. Liquids used to improve one's appearance. i.e. The woman's **make up**.

Make up for: Compensate for.

i.e. The farmers were given money to make up for their lost.

Make certain:

- 1. Check that it is true, correct. i.e. **Make certain** that you have all lessons.
- 2. Not leave something to chance or luck. i.e. Make certain that you get good marks.

Make do: Use something although one would prefer something else.

i.e. We have to **make do** with what we have in the laboratory.

Make a fool of: Cause somebody to seem silly.

i.e. They made a fool of themselves.

Make fun of: Laugh at.

i.e. They made fun of each other.

Make it:

- 1. Estimate time, distance i.e. What time do you **make it**?
- 2. Reach; manage to arrive (with difficulty). i.e.It's late, I don't think we'll make it.
